



## Together 2030 Reaction to the Zero Draft Resolution on the Follow up and Review of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development at the global level

May 17 2016

A “robust, voluntary, effective, participatory, transparent and integrated follow-up and review framework” (para 72, 2030 Agenda) will make a vital contribution to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

Together 2030<sup>1</sup> ([www.together2030.org](http://www.together2030.org)) presents below its comments and inputs to the **zero draft resolution on follow up and review of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development**. Those recommendations are based on the position paper [Essential Elements for an ambitious, inclusive and participatory follow up and review of the 2030 Agenda](#).

### Key Comments:

- **On the number of voluntary national reviews (OP 8):** The resolution should encourage Member States to consider carrying out **at least three** voluntary national reviews at the high-level political forum between now and 2030. The current proposal is too prescriptive and goes against the **voluntary** nature of national reviews at the HLPF and Member States should be encouraged and have the necessary space to report more often and not be limited to only two reviews from now until 2030.
- **On participation** - The language on **OP 12** is an extract of **Para 14 of Resolution 67/290** and does not properly cover the breadth of the commitment towards the enhanced consultative role and participation of the major groups and other relevant stakeholders at the international level. We recommend adding the full language of **Para 14 of 67/290** to balance **OP 12** accordingly to the commitments also expressed on the 2030 Agenda.
- **On the proposed themes and sub-set of Goals (OP 4):** We are concerned that the proposed themes and sub-set of Goals to be reviewed from 2017-2019 do not properly reflect the **interlinkages and cross-cutting nature of the goals** and tend to isolate them accordingly to the pillars of sustainable development. This may lead to unbalanced Ministerial Declarations that do not reflect the commitments of the 2030 Agenda. We recommend that the themes and sub-set of Goals are revised, going beyond the mere artificial allocation of goals accordingly to the sustainable development pillars. Allowing space for exploration of interlinkages between the goals will be key in every HLPF session.
- **On hosting meetings of the HLPF under the auspices of the ECOSOC even in years when the HLPF meets under the auspices of the General Assembly:** It is extremely important to maintain the HLPF meetings under the auspices of ECOSOC even in years when the HLPF will also meet under the auspices of the General Assembly. The 2030 Agenda cannot afford to miss several years of national reviews (only held under the auspices of ECOSOC) and the cycle of reviews cannot be broken (OP 20).
